Greene County Council on the Arts (GCCA) launches its 2018 season with "Ginnie Gardiner & Martin Katzoff: Conversations in Color." The concept of the exhibition came from a pairing of the two artists works at the Patricia Field ArtFashion show in October 2017 by production designer Geoff Howell. GCCA's Visual Arts Director, Niva Dorell, was struck by the similarities in gesture and flow between the two artists' vibrant paintings. The paint-ings seemed to be talking to each other from across time and canvases. Gardiner and Katzoff, both Catskill residents, will participate in an Artist Talk about painting and color during the exhibition. They will also be present at the opening reception, which will be held on Saturday, January 27, 2018 from 5:00 to 7:00 pm at the GCCA's Catskill Gallery immediately following the Catskill Gallery immediately following the GCCA Annual Membership Meeting. onversations in Color are from her "Talking ith Tiepolo" series that she created in the te 1990's. Inspired by Baroque master iiambattista Tiepolo (1696-1770), this eries resulted in two solo exhibitions in lew York and Minneapolis in 2000, and pointe images fueing Baroque references Giambattista New York and Minneapolis in 2000, and depicts images fusing Baroque references with a range of contemporary images in layered pictorial spaces, producing paint-ings rich in color and dramatic figuration. Gardiner cites a passage from 'Tiepolo and the Pictorial Intelligence,' written by Svetlana Alpers and Michael Baxandall, as a perfect summation of her personal approach to creating these images: "The mind plays with images, and they can take different forms: figures can drift between two and three dimensions before full recognition; they are curiously medium-free; they can New they are curiously medium-free; they can move in slow motion...the array displays a coherence, but is strange or bizarre; time is not an issue." http://ginniegardiner.com/visual-thinking/. Ginnie Gardiner graduated from Cornell University with a Bachelor of Fine Arts in 1974. In 2005, Ginnie and her husband moved to Catskill, where they purchased, renovated and restored the Catskill Lyceum, a Federal era building, where Thomas Cole gave his lectures on American Scenery in 1836. Gardiner's recent paintings will be featured in a solo exhi-bition titled "The Color Prophecies" at the Woodstock Artists Association and Museum from October 20- November 25, 2018. Martin Katzoff's paintings in Conversations in Color, from his Untitled Exploration series, are more abstract than Gardiner's, but no less vibrant or rich in texture. A printmaker as well as painter, Katzoff primarily creates from a place of intuition. With this series, he says he was attempting to access a roadmap to a subconscious perception of experience of reality, and conveying a sense of freedom and openness in how they are interpreted. "Each painting represents the release of

anxieties with the objective of moving through time, some figural elements repre-sent interpreted personal experiences, but the main objective of the series was to loosen up and go along for the ride." Katzoff is originally from Providence, Rhode Island, and has been living in Catskill for the past few years as he studies for his Bachelor of Fine Arts at Bard College. He cites the beautiful nature of the Hudson Valley as a major influence on his recent artwork. He is currently involved in a project with Freehand Hotels, painting murals at their soon-to-open location in Gramercy Park. 

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



The Thomas Cole Site is thrilled to announce the 200th year anniversary of Thomas Cole's arrival in America. Thomas Cole (1801-1848) emigrated from

year anniversary of Thomas Cole's arrival in America. Thomas Cole (1801-1848) emigrated from Northern England in 1818 with his family at the age of 17. Cole went on to found America's first major art movement, the Hudson River School of landscape painting, which profoundly shaped this nation's identity and addressed the prescient issues of preserva-tion vs. development head on. The bicentennial coincides with a major Thomas Cole exhibition at The Metropolitan Museum of Art entitled Thomas Cole's Journey: Atlantic Crossings opening in January and traveling to the National Gallery, London, in June of 2018. A complementary exhibition exploring the interna-tional context of Thomas Cole's work will be presented at the Thomas Cole Site in May 2018 in partnership with the Yale University Department of Art History and the partnership with the Yale University Department of Art History and the Yale Center for British Art.

Immigrating to the United States in 1818, the same year Cole arrived, Wall provided the water-colors for the popular volume *The Hudson River Portfolio*. The book's release coincided with the trans-formation of the Hudson Valley into a destination for landscape tourism, likely encouraging Cole to visit the region. But the *Portfolio* showcased the industrialization springing up in the Hudson Valley, while Cole purposely omitted signs of such commercial activity in his early canvases. Toward the end of the 1820s, however, the two artists enjoyed a relation-ship characterized by reciprocal influence. While the *Portfolio* may have drawn Cole to the Hudson Valley, Cole's first canvases of the area encouraged Wall revisit the region, to try his hand at painting in oil, and to experiment with more region, to try his hand at painting in oil, and to experiment with more idiosyncratic compositions similar to those he saw in Cole's work.



Jennie Allen

Jennie Allen is a writer, film Jennie Allen is a writer, film-maker, and teacher living in Catskill. Before landing in film a decade ago, she worked for Unity House in Troy, NY as a mental health coun-

Hoy, NY as a menan health coun-selor. Jennie's current short film, The Clinic, is about a woman with a terminal cancer diagnosis who participates in an experimental research study, taking a high dose of psilocybin to face her fears about dying. This is a narrative film based on rigorous research studies at Johns Hopkins and New York University that have tested the use of entheogenic agents to help patients suffering from emotional distress at the end of life (as well as from addictions and PTSD). aistress at the end of life (as well as from addictions and PTSD). These studies have shown strong evidence that the careful use of entheogene such as psilocybin can have long lasting therapeutic effects for people facing a terminal illness. efte. illness. As

As a filmmaker and a Com-munity Hospice volunteer, Jennie is interested in how we approach dying and death. The film is rooted in the real practices and firsthand accounts of research subjects outlined by Dr. William Richards at Johns Hopkins University at Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine. Reading these accounts had a profound effect on Jennie; they illustrate the power of addressing deep psychological and spiritual concerns into our care for the dying, and illuminate the way we live our lives - often cut off from the truth of our mortality, our shared future, and our connected-ness. The film attempts to be both ness. The film attempts to be both an inquiry and a model for this kind of work

of work. Jennie's artistic goal for The Clinic is to create a visceral experi-ence - to have the film lead an audi-ence through the journey of this character as she faces her darkest fears about dying, "meeting" her cancer, and leaving her husband and daughter behind. Creating this inner iournev using live action this inner journey using live action rather than visual effects has proved to be as challenging as Jennie anticipated, and while principal

Jennie partnered with Catwalk Institute, a local artist resi-dency which provided time, space, stunning locations, and untold stunning locations, and untold support. Jennie's other current projects include the feature film Culebra - a dark comedy about grief, addiction, and the spirituality of imperfection - in development with lohns Hopkins is an advisor The Clinic. imperfection - in development with Fidelio Films, and the television pilot Sunshine, about a depressed pilot Sunshine, about a depressed teenage girl who joins an upstate farm commune/collective. Recent work includes co-writing the short film *Dear Chickens* (directed by Mauro Mueller) starring Philip Baker Hall and Kerris Dorsey, which screened in October at the Zurich Film Festival. 

A few years ago, I was serving as a sort of Jack-Of-All-Trades for The Register Star and The Catskill Daily Mail - weekend editor, social media maven, staff videog-rapher - when I kept on running into people who wanted to go on camera wanting to talk about some old movie they had been in 1959. The film was called "Odds Against Tomorrow," and briefly put, it was about two men - one black and one white - who were brought together to rob a bank in a small town Upstate. The movie was shot in Hudson and starred two of the biggest stars in America at the time: Harry Belafonte and Robert Ryan.For whatever reason (perhaps because of its extremely dark world widt the public. with the public.

Apparently, tons of people in the town of Hudson had served the town of Hudson had served as extras in the movie or played a part in the production, and many of them served as a main demo-graphic at the papers, so I got it into my head to do a short video about peoples' memories of the event. To do so, I thought I should sit through the old movie, and when I did so, I was gobsmacked. That movie, all about the price of intolerance, was as relevant for today's world as it

about the price of intolerance, was as relevant for today's world as it had been in 1959. I was hooked. So, I started filming people. People like Bonnie Huber. And their stories were, by and large hilarious, interesting, poignant, or powerful. I thought to myself, "Hmm...this would make a very pertinent docu-mentary for 2017." Thus, the idea for my own film-about-a-film was formed. A word about my art: I have realized through years of film-

A word about my art: I have realized through years of film-making that my work can have extreme power in galvanizing and promoting community conscious-ness - thus, consciousness as a whole. A video I did for The NY Times about Hudson five years ago was one of the contributors towards the hype that led to the town's revitalization. Same goes for a video I did for Chronogram a few years ago on Kingston and the few years ago on Kingston and the then-nascent O Positive Festival. then-nascent O Positive Festival. My work is designed to inspire the public and increase our sense of human community. So I thought: "Wouldn't it be cool if we could involve the public with this new project, just as Belafonte had done with the city of Hudson in 1959?" So I broached the idea of having a Harry Belafonte Day in Hudson with our mayor, Tiffany

Hudson had recently declared itself a sanctuary city, and what could be more inspiring than having Harry Belafonte, one of the greatest heroes of the civil rights movement, come and pay the town a very well publicized visit during these very dark times? It would be a particularly good for the kids of the area, to meet one of the great icons of American culture.

icons of American culture. Tiffany and I drafted a letter for the Belafontes. I applied for the tor the Belatontes. I applied for the individual artist's grant. And voila, a few months later, to my glee, I won! To be honest, I wasn't all that surprised – every artist dreams of projects like this that can empower and benefit their own communities – I just had happened to come up with a doozy!

a doozy! What I hadn't planned for was the actual logistical complications of transporting a 90 year-old civil rights icon and his rather large family from one side of the country to another; creating events; finding hotels; arranging for trans-portation. porta

portation. None of which is insurmount-able, by any means. But there's making movies, and there's moving mountains. Let's see, in 2018, if we can do both. David McDonald is a long-time journalist who hor came a filomaker

David McDonald is a long-time journalist who became a filmmaker about 15 years ago, after moving Upstate. He is the director of the films "Woodstock Can't Get There From Here" and "Woodstock Revisited," which chart the rise of the American counterculture through events that transpired over the course of the last century in Woodstock, New York. His palette is the Hudson Valley. Over the past ten years, his short films have appeared in The

short films have appeared in The NY Times, CNN, Good Morning and Time Magazine America.

America, and Time Magazine, among others. Subjects have included Marc Chagall's time spent as a refugee in High Falls in Upstate, NY, in the mid-1940s, Ella Fitzgerald's incarceration at The New York Training School For Girls in Hudson as a 16 year-old in 1933, and a TV pilot about The Chanler Family of Rhinebeck.

At Indiana University, I took "Life Drawing" from William Bailey, who spent only seven years at our school, then accepted a position at

school, then accepted a position at Yale and a decade later had one of his paintings featured on the cover of *Newsweek*. He was known, while he was at I.U., as the best artist in the department, but I also found him to be the best teacher I had in college. At that time, in the 1960s, it was the custom of the painting and drawing faculty to meet briefly with the class, set up the model, then escape to their studios. Not Bailey. He stayed with his classes for the entire three hours, running

Bailey. He stayed with his classes for the entire three hours, running drills like a coach. We would begin with 10 second gesture drawings, move up to 30 second, then grad-uate, eventually, to a two-hour drawing. We used the HB pencil on high quality white paper (he loathed newsprint and wouldh' allow it in the drawing room), but he also favored ink because it was difficult. cetting the line right the

he also favored ink because it was difficult, getting the line right the first time, or learning to deal with mistakes. All the while we were drawing, he would circle the room, coming up behind us, pointing to a particular line, "What's that doing? How is it working?" Every line, he taught, had to have a purpose. If it didn't, it shouldn't be there. (It was a lot like writing, I realized later. Every word should be pulling its own weight.)

His critiques were tough but never sarcastic, as were many

but never sarcastic, as were many of the other professors'. He would first ask, after we'd tacked our drawings to the wall, "What do you see that you like?" We'd mention the curve of a hip or a long, sinuous line that had captured a certain pose, and then we'd go on to what could be improved. (As a

Bend the Knotted Oak Chamber Music (BKO) will present a salon concert of Russian music for cello and piano, featuring Robert Reed and Uel Wade. Most of the music on the program was composed since the Russian Revolution, the world-shaking event of one-hundred-and-one years aro of one-hundred-and-one-years ago. Aueroacn. Nikolai Miaskovsky (1881-1950) was awarded the 1941 Stalin Prize. He is considered one of the

three greatest Russian and Soviet composers, along with Prokofiev and Shostakovich. At Moscow Conservatory Miaskovsky taught Kkatchaturian and Kabalevsky. Unfortunately, his contribu-tion to the celebrations of the 30th anniversary of the October Revolution was considered too dark and pessimistic, and he was denounced in 1948. This blotted out his career. His music was expelled from the concert halls of tom the concert halls of

denounced in 1948. This blotted out his career. His music was expelled from the concert halls of the Soviet Union. Miaskovsky's father, a general in the tsar's army, was shot by revolutionary forces in1919. The composer-son served in WWI; and, being of the old order, had to hide his feelings and stay out of political intrigues. His second Sonata, played on this program, is often mournful in the Russian way, but definitely not pessimistic, and often rhapsodic. Although written

in 1949, its style is solidly in the late Romantic lyrical tradition, and is a beautifully crafted, attractive piece. Tikhon Khrennikov (1913-2007) rose quickly through the ranks of leading Soviet composers, partly through compositional excel-lence, and partly because he saw the value of ingratiating himself with Soviet leaders by adopting the optimistic, dramatic, and lyrical style favored by those leaders. He became a favorite of Stalin by denouncing the "formalism" of Shostakovich and Prokofiev, and was chosen to be the secretary of the composers' union. However, there is no clear consensus on the composer's ideological stance. (In spite of his position and the ugly politicization of music during this period, Khrennikov quietly provided money for the disgraced Prokofiev to buy food!) In any case, his he must be judged by his music,

which is very powerful. In this cello sonata you may be forgiven if you hear elements of those composers he officially denounced, especially their fondness for march rhythms and sardonic humor. Alexander Tcherepnin (1899-

and sardonic humor. Alexander Tcherepnin (1899-1977) fled St. Petersburg to Georgia after the October Revolution, where he lived for three years. He devel-oped an enthusiasm for Georgian music but left Russia permanently after that region was Sovietized. He spent time in Paris, China, and Japan before moving permanently to the US, where he became a citizen. In 1967 was invited by the Soviet government to return to Russia on a concert tour. BKO will play his "Songs and Dances," composed in the US in 1953, in which he recalls Russian, Georgian, Kazakh, and Tatar folklore. Leah Auerbach (1973 -) was born to a Jewish musical family in a city near Siberia. A brilliant pianist, she was given a permit as a teenager to visit the US in 1991 on a concert tour, during which she defected. Although she

on a concert tour, during which she defected. Although she spoke no English, she was so determined to pursue a musical career she walked


